

to find eventually that it does the opposite, meaning that the area under the curve is less than the area of the rectangle. The Riemann's Approximation is given by the formula:

$$A \approx \sum_{i=1}^n f(x_i^*) \Delta x$$

is going to be bigger than the area of the rectangle with height  $f(a)$  and less than smaller than the area of the rectangle with height  $f(b)$ . From integral calculus (and geometry, that is, that fact) somewhere in there between  $a$  and  $b$  there's an exact height,  $f(c)$ , such that if you use that exact demonstration of a mean theorem has  $f(c)$  as the height of the rectangle, exactly  $f(c)$  because they're so much much less (or more) such that the rectangle of this height  $f(c)$  over the whole interval  $[a, b]$  has exactly the area we want, the Mean Value of all the heights  $f(x)$  expenditure-rates, or other words in abstracted form:

$$f(c) = \frac{1}{b-a} \int_a^b f(x) dx$$

where  $(b-a)$  is just the size of the interval. And so here's a look at the resulting diagram labeled 148138219C.

The following graph shows that there is a point  $c$  such that the area under the curve  $f(x)$  is equal to the area of the rectangle with height  $f(c)$  and width  $(b-a)$ . The point  $c$  is the point where the curve  $f(x)$  intersects the line  $y = f(c)$ . The area under the curve  $f(x)$  is shaded, and the area of the rectangle is also shaded. The curve  $f(x)$  is concave up, and the rectangle is inscribed under it.
