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expansion and diversification of the database for studying language development is important because it creates new opportunities for testing theoretical claims. While some conclude for example that children in Mexico possess very adult like semantic pragmatic competence in the domain of the pragmatic implicatures associated with existential quantifiers others conclude that in particular sociolinguistic registers of Chilean Spanish children are late to develop adult like competence in plural marking.
